

IAL: to identify and name a variety of common wild plants.

A wild plant is a plant that grows by itself. It does not need to be planted or cared for as it grows. A wild plant seed grows where it falls, if a wild plant grows where it is not wanted then it may be known as a weed.


Here are some wild plants in the table below. Do you recognise any? Look carefully for these plants on your next walk or in your garden. Each time you see one, mark a line on the tally chart.


Photo 2
